I. True friendship is a godly commitment to one another. (1 Samuel 18:1-3)

"Covenant" — A commitment of loyalty, by two or more people, dependent upon God's grace, for our good and God's glory.

Timothy Keller - "To be loved but not known is comforting but superficial. To be known and not loved is our greatest fear. But to be fully known and truly loved is, well, a lot like being loved by God.

It is what we need more than anything. It liberates us from pretense, humbles us out of our self-righteousness, and fortifies us for any difficulty life can throw at us."
